



Terry M. Kinney is a Federal Prosecutor in the Organized Crime and Public Corruption Section of the United States Attorney's Office in Chicago, Illinois. The United States Attorney's Office in Chicago, Illinois is one of the largest Federal Prosecutor's Offices in the United States and is renowned for its anti-corruption work.

Terry did his undergraduate studies at Stonehill College in Massachusetts and the Sorbonne, University of Paris. Terry graduated from the University of Notre Dame Law School. Upon graduation, Terry served as the law clerk to the Chief Judge of the Northern District of Indiana, and as a law clerk to the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit, an intermediate federal appellate court directly below the United States Supreme Court. Terry also served as the Deputy Circuit Executive for the Seventh Circuit, working as a Court administrator for two years.

Terry joined the Federal prosecutor's office in 1988, and has tried more than thirty jury trials and argued more than 30 federal appeals. He has handled hundreds of criminal investigations including human trafficking, narcotics, guns and violent offenses, white collar, public corruption and money laundering offenses. Terry presently serves as the International Affairs Coordinator for the Chicago office.

In 2004, Terry was sent overseas by the Department of Justice to serve in Moscow, Russia where he worked with the Russian government on human trafficking and organized crime (2004-2009), to Jakarta, Indonesia where he worked on counter terrorism, terror finance and money laundering (2009-2014), to Dhaka, Bangladesh where he worked on counterterrorism and money laundering, and to Nepal, the Philippines and India where he worked on trafficking and terrorism.

Terry arrived in Bucharest in October and is working to establish a Department of Justice office in Romania and Bucharest. Terry resides in Chicago, Illinois with his wife and children.
